



FOREWORD

Just before I sat down to write this foreword I had finished reading one of the most fascinating and interesting books I have ever read : " A Short History of the World" by Geoffrey Blainey, probably Australia's greatest historian. It demonstrated that history repeats itself and just how important the study of history is in shaping the future.

The reading of this History of the Old Scotch Collegians' Lodge not only gives an appreciation of that Lodge and Freemasonry in general, but also of its background and relationship with one of Melbourne's greatest sources of education and learning, Scotch College.

History is primarily the action and influence of human beings, and it reminds me of three of the people who figure in this History who were well known to me personally. Firstly that "Mr. Chips" of learning, Frank Fleming, whose influence on the building of character and the development of young men, was invaluable.

Secondly, Frank Oldfield, a pioneer in the development of the Aviation Industry in this country, was an outstanding philosopher and lecturer. Thirdly, the Rev. Alec Fraser, the long time Chaplain of Scotch College who only came to Freemasonry in his later years. It would be impossible to estimate the influence he must have had on thousands of young men.

This History also reminded me of the changes that have taken place, not only in the conduct of our meetings, but in our more open attitude to the general public and our desire to make known to the public at large the charitable nature of our institution.

This History is not just written for the benefit of those actively connected with the Craft, but for our children and grandchildren and those that come after us. Who of us knows to what extent our actions of today will affect those who come after us. The poet was certainly right when he composed those famous lines :

Lives of great men still remind us — we can make our lives sublime and departing, leave behind us footprints in the sands of time.

EDITORIAL PREFACE

Before I attained the age of sixty I was requested to bring the history of this Lodge up to date. With the enthusiasm of the not so old, I resurrected all available Minute Books and other documents, such as earlier notes prepared by J G (George) McNicholl and my brother Donald Wood. These proved of great assistance because they committed to writing their memories of events. Believe me, Minute Books of the Lodge are not very helpful for compiling a history, as there is no record of what transpired whilst we were at refreshment, or in Masonic terms, in the South. In some instances, one might argue that the Social Committee Books were used more as notebooks.

At this stage I must do two things : first, to remind Readers that my assistants have used their best endeavours to report with accuracy names, dates, and other details. The other point is to thank those who have assisted me in many ways. Initially I was assisted by Ron Gould, whose Secretary typed notes I had made after perusing documents. In about 1990, Jim Blair-Holt, Frank Oldfield and myself were appointed as a committee to complete the History, but unfortunately both passed to the Grand Lodge above before accomplishing anything of note. Then more recently, pressure was applied to finish the job. Because of failing eyesight, I asked Ian Latimer, Maurie Smith and Manson Russel to become assistant editors, each looking after a 25 year period of the History. In early 2000, Bill Tingate then Senior Warden, was appointed to facilitate its completion and production.

I must also thank Brian Morris and David Ferguson, who were largely responsible for the preparation of the appended lists, and Bruce Symon, Lodge Secretary, to whom some work has naturally fallen. Finally, I wish to thank my daughter Susan and her friend Angela Nickless, who put my words onto computer, and my youngest daughter Liz who took several of the photos which have been included.

At no time did I intend to deal with the history of Freemasonry, however at this point in time it seems appropriate to say something, even though I do not profess to be a student of Masonic history. As I understand it, our Craft is practised worldwide, at least in free countries, and existed in a slightly different form prior to the first century. It covers all people who have a belief in a Supreme Being. In some countries it is not uncommon for several different Volumes of the Sacred Law to be open on the Master's pedestal in the Lodge room, indicating the universality of Freemasonry.

INTRODUCTION


Understanding the Past is important if one is to appreciate the Present and be able to influence the Future.

In the compilation of a record, be it a history or diary of events, the validity and importance of the facts, are dependent both on the style of the author and the attention to detail by those who have gone before, who hopefully have recorded accurately the events, and not merely recorded their own perceptions of what should or did occur.


In the preparation of this record of the first 75 years of the Scotch Collegians' Masonic Lodge, which in 2001 became the Old Scotch Collegians Masonic Lodge, No.396 on the register of the United Grand Lodge of Victoria, it must be clearly stated at the outset that some statements, dates etc. are not capable of being confirmed, as correspondence and other archival material has not been retained or is not available for perusal. However credit for the tremendous amount of work done in the middle forties must be given to the late Rt. Wor. Bro. J. George McNicholl, P.S.G.W. for preparing a brief history of the Lodge up to 1945. Subsequently, Rt.Wor.Bro. I. J. A. (Jim) Blair-Holt P.J.G.W. prepared a further abbreviated history, and Wor. Bro. Donald M. Wood, P.G.Swd.B. edited these histories. Rt. Wor. Bro. Frank W. Oldfield P.S.G.W. was to bring all the information up to date from what others had attempted, but unfortunately his only copy went astray in the mail and has been lost forever.

Having in mind the recollections and recordings of the afore mentioned Brethren, where archival material is not now available, the best and most reliable comments of these Brethren have been adopted in this History; and of course it is again acknowledged that it is to them that so much of this is owed. Never the less, the extensive time donated by the year 2000 History Committee in the final compilation of all the recorded facts and the assessment of the overwhelming volume of recorded material, should also be recognised and applauded. Many names are included in this historical summary. In addition, the names of all recorded members, both initiates and joining members during the 75 years, have been appended hereto - one list in alphabetical order, the other in numerical order to assist future inquirers. No attempt has been made to record the dates of deaths.

Although through the years very many members have contributed so much to making this Lodge a leader in the Craft, the Brethren who are mentioned in the text are considered to mark especially significant periods in the progress of the Lodge. Apart from the foundation members, masonic titles and ranks have generally been omitted to provide a more informal read. Masonic titles and ranks can be obtained by contacting the Lodge Secretary.

THE FORMATION OF THE LODGE.

In the "Scotch Collegian" of May 1925 on page 112 appeared the following:-

"The College Chaplain, the Reverent Farquar Chisholm is calling a meeting to consider the formation of an Old Scotch Collegians' Masonic Lodge. The Meeting will be held on Tuesday 9th June at 8.00 pm in the Grand Secretary's office, 25 Collins Street, Melbourne". It should be recorded that during 1925 the Reverend Farquar Chisholm was involved in the establishment of a Girl's Presbyterian College in Geelong which later became known as "Morongo". He left Scotch College towards the end of 1925 to take up the position as Minister of St. Cuthbert's Church, Ballarat. This could explain why he was not a foundation member of the Lodge and why his name does not appear on any of the lists of members in this history. There is no evidence to show that he did in fact attend the meeting.

At the meeting on the 9th of June 1925, George McNicholl was appointed Chairman of the committee set up to consider the formation of a Lodge for old Scotch Collegians and members of the school staff. After the resolution to form "The Scotch Collegians' Lodge" had been passed unanimously, it was proposed that George McNicholl should be its first Worshipful Master. The wisdom in not naming the lodge the "Old Scotch Collegians" allowed for the possibility of a schoolboy being a member as a Lewis. George McNicholl declined to take on the office of Master due to an impending overseas trip and proposed Wor. Bro. Dr. A. J. Philpott He did however accept the office of Director of in his stead. The proposition of Jack Philpott was then unanimously Ceremonies. agreed to and he duly became the first Worshipful Master of the Scotch Collegians' Lodge. Bro. Norman McLeod offered to take up the position of Secretary for the organising committee and further meetings were held in his office until the list of Officers was decided and the petition for a charter prepared and signed for submission. The Old Melburnians' Lodge No. 317 which had been formed in October, 1922 consented to act as the Sponsor Lodge, and on the 22nd October, 1925 the Grand Master approved the submitted petition.

THE BEGINNING

On the 23rd November, 1925 at the Masonic Hall, 25 Collins Street, Melbourne, the Scotch Collegians' Lodge, No.396 on the Register of the United Grand Lodge of Victoria was Constituted and Consecrated by Most Worshipful Brother F.T. Hickford, M.A., LLB., Pro Grand Master, assisted by Right Worshipful Brother W. Warren Kerr, C.M.G., C.B.E., Deputy Grand Master, and Right Worshipful Brother W. Player Bice, Past Deputy Grand Master. Very Worshipful Brother H.D. Hirst, Grand Director of Ceremonies was in charge of the proceedings which included over fifty Present and Past Grand Officers.

Applications as Joining Members were made by eleven brethren, and there were two propositions received from prospective candidates. At the Festive Board on the inaugural night, the flag of Scotch College was supported by the flags of Melbourne Grammar and Wesley College. The Foundation Officers of the Lodge were:-

1925 to 1930

On the 3rd February, 1926 the Lodge performed its first ceremony by initiating Mr. H.W. McIver and Dr. S.G. Strahan. By this date, three more nominations for Joining Members had been received and there were four propositions for candidates in hand. On the 25th October, 1926 the Honourable H.S.W. Lawson (later Sir Harry Lawson, Premier of Victoria from 1918 to 1924) was installed in the Chair of King Solomon (by dispensation) and under his guidance on the 6th April, 1927, the Presbyterian Church of Victoria made a request of Scotch Collegians' Lodge to act as sponsors of a new Lodge to be called "Nec Tamen Lodge" No. 429. This was approved and the new Lodge was constituted and consecrated on the 25th July, 1927 at a special meeting. Nine days later, at the regular meeting, which by now was held on the first Wednesday of each month, the Worshipful Master and Officers of the "Duke of Clarence Lodge" No.172 of Yea, Victoria, paid a special visit for the purpose of carrying out the ceremony of raising to the third degree a member of the Lodge, Frank M. Read who later became our first unofficial "Director of Entertainment in the South".

1927 also saw the inaugural Combined Schools Lodge meeting. Lodges eligible to join this group were those whose schools were either members of the Public Schools of Victoria or the Associated Grammar Schools of Victoria. This meeting is still held annually, however the membership criteria has altered to include any Lodge with educational affiliations. During 1926/27 due to the many official government functions as past Premier of the State of Victoria, the Hon. H.S.W. Lawson was unable to perform some of the duties which befall the Worshipful Master. The chair at times was occupied by various Past Masters including George Anderson, Frank Osboldstone and Nathan Benjamin who later was our Lodge Chaplain for many years.

In 1928, Alan Hooper was installed as Worshipful Master and the wife of George Anderson presented the Lodge with the cushion for the Volume of the Sacred Law to rest upon. This cushion remained in use until 1967 when it was replaced, thanks to the wife of the then Worshipful Master, Phil Graham. That year also saw the rise in annual subscription from Two Pounds, Twelve Shillings to Three Guineas (\$5.20 to \$6.30). 1928 also saw a letter of congratulations being sent to Dr. W.S. Littlejohn, Principal of the School, on gaining his Doctorate. The Benevolent Fund was instituted during 1930, the year that saw Max Bailey become the first candidate for initiation as a Lewis at No.396. Max Bailey is remembered for his contribution to rowing at Scotch. He was the cox in 3 consecutive Head of the River crews, the crew winning in 1926.

1930 to 1935

A Music Master of the school, W. Fyshe was installed as Master of the Lodge in 1930. Other members of the school staff in the Lodge at that time were the elocution master, H.W. Russel (father of our current member Manson Russel), A. J. Waller, Head Master of the Junior School, C.E. Sandford, H.H. Bowden, later Vice-Principal of the school and A.D.Ross, Senior Mathematics Master. At this time C.H.F.Yelland, the local pharmacist, was invested as Secretary of the Lodge, a position he held until 1947, an extended term not yet surpassed. During 1931 Alan Hooper presented a set of gavels to the Lodge, and the Lodge donated a Special Prize to the School to mark the School's eightieth birthday. That custom continued for many years with the presentation of an annual prize, to be awarded at the discretion of the Principal, to a deserving year 12 student who had included Latin amongst his subjects. Later, Latin as a prerequisite was dropped.

Scotch Collegians hosted the Combined Lodges night for the first time on the 29th May, 1933. In November 1934 the banner bearing the Lodge insignia and displayed in the Lodge at every meeting since, was presented, and in 1935 the Lodge's own Ballot box came into being.

1935 to 1940

1935 saw Frank Read installed in the chair of King Solomon. Frank was the first initiate of No.396 to attain the chair. Keith Wilson, who was Secretary of the Old Scotch Collegians Association (O.S.C.A) during the mid 1930's, initiated the arrangement that all Old Boy groups using the school name, should be affiliated with O.S.C.A. In 1936 the Lodge made the important decision to comply with the request and on the 4th November of that year became an affiliated member of O.S.C.A. It should be noted that Keith Wilson joined the Lodge in June 1945 and has since received his fifty year service jewel. The first "Old Boys' Night" was held on the 5th May 1937 with Jack Gamble as the Master. This has become an annual night in May to which Old Scotch Collegians who are Freemasons in other Masonic Lodges are especially invited to attend.

1939 saw Alf Elvish, the Lodge Auditor for many years, install his successor Reg Perry in the chair of the Lodge. An interesting occasion in 1937 was the initiation of two brothers destined to become pillars of the Lodge, namely Donald and Pat Wood. They were also later passed and raised together. Whilst most would know of Pat's enthusiasm for the School, fewer would know that it was with a grant of money from Donald on his death that the School Archives and Museum were started with the employment of Geoff Tolson, as Archivist, a member of Clarke Lodge No. 98. In 1938 it was decided to help the children at the Kildonan Presbyterian Children's Homes by staging an Annual Christmas Treat which was enthusiastically supported by the members. This event grew to providing a picnic, weather permitting, at the Berwick showgrounds, for over 100 children and staff of Kildonan. No.396 members were responsible for transporting the children and staff to the picnic. The 29th May, 1939 saw No.396 again host the Combined Schools Lodge night. Because of these social functions and special nights, in December 1939, the Social Committee was expanded to eleven members.

1940 to 1945

During this period the Lodge initiated over 35 members and was instrumental in Passing and Raising a number of servicemen from other countries. On the 3rd July 1940 the Lodge presented money belts to two brethren who had enlisted in the Australian Imperial Forces. Brethren who joined the services were invariably posted away from Melbourne and attendances dropped to an average during 1942-1943 of twenty four members a meeting. Masonic dress (full tails) was dropped during this period and immediately after due to clothes rationing. In March 1942 our second Lewis was initiated, his name, Maurie Smith. After being Passed in June, 1942 he was Raised in July, 1942 as he was off to train in Canada before serving with the R.A.F. in the U.K. The Lodge was most unfortunate in losing one of its members in the active service of his country in Val Henderson, who was initiated in February 1941 and was "Killed in Action" in May, 1942. In 1941 Alan Hooper was appointed as a Grand Steward, the first Grand Lodge appointment our Lodge had attained. During these war years we saw many visitors from interstate and other countries who were temporarily in Melbourne and on the 2nd September, 1942 we passed to the Second Degree Brother M.T. Thomas of Cornwallis Lodge No.14 of the Grand Lodge of Oregon, 1944 was the year of Vic Nilsen's Installation. He was installed U.S.A. by his father Wor.Bro. O.J. Nilsen, P.J.G.D. later Lord Mayor of Melbourne and of 3UZ radio station fame. Also in 1944, due to the efforts of Frank Read, Cec Hooper and Ian Crapp a "Dramatic Society and Choir" was formed, which as well as being responsible for comedy sketches in the South, welcomed back to the Lodge those who had been absent serving their country, in not always musical, but always in hilarious fashion, that gave free rein to the trio's lyrical and poetic skills, on a portable stage contrived by Jack McCleery. These presentations were great audience pleasers on such special nights as Installations, Last Nights, Old Boys' nights etc.

1945-1950

Lodge history was made with the Installation of Alan Hooper, in the December of 1945 by occupying the Chair of King Solomon for the second time after the Master Elect, Pat Wood, Junior Warden, had renounced the opportunity on medical advice, though he was able to take the office in 1946. Our first annual "At Home" for twenty years for members and friends was held in 1945. Our Foundation Almoner and then Secretary for twenty years in Charlie Yelland was, until he died in 1949, one of the two surviving Foundation members who had held office since its consecration and in 1947 a presentation of a suitably inscribed silver salver was made to him as a token of the esteem the members held for him and to celebrate his Fifty years in the craft.

The other member was Fred Whitelaw who was the un-opposed Treasurer until 1954. A momentous decision was made during 1949 : our meeting place, the Masonic Hall at 25 Collins Street Melbourne, was not providing the facilities required for Entertainment in the South and several other factors made it desirable to move the Lodge meeting place. After exhaustive research the decision was made to transfer the meeting place to the Launder Street Masonic Temple, Hawthorn. With Grand Lodge approval, the first meeting in our new venue was on the 1st February, 1950. We continued holding our meetings on the first Wednesday of the month as had been the previous practice.

1950-1955

In 1951 the following resolution was passed in the Lodge and forwarded to the Principal of the School:

"On this, the third day of October, 1951, the last regular meeting night in the twenty-sixth year of the Scotch Collegians' Lodge, we, its members and those Old Boys of the School among our guests who are members of other Masonic Lodges, fondly recalling our years at School, join with Old Boys wherever they may be in celebrating the Centenary of the founding of Scotch College, Melbourne.

We recognise with gratitude the debt the School owes to the Head Masters and Masters.

We view with pride the achievements of Old Boys in many fields of service to God and to the Nation, and we rejoice in the knowledge that the School today is as well fitted as ever before, to train it's sons to render such service.

It is our wish that the terms of this resolution be conveyed by letter to the Head Master, and through him to the Council of the College with an expression of our continued affectionate loyalty"

The meeting which passed this resolution was attended by over 250 Old Boys from all over Victoria, interstate and from overseas. The overseas visitors included Hal Manson from New Zealand, a former probationer of the school, whose father had been a member of the School Council.

The change of venue of the Lodge undoubtedly was first talked about at the weekly luncheons which were started by Jack McCleery in 1949 and were held in various hotels around South Melbourne until 1962 when a more permanent abode was established at the St. Andrews Hotel in Carlton. It was also possible to hold a "Mid-Winter Dance" at Launder Street and the first of these was held in 1950. By the opening of the "Fifties", five years of peace had seen the rejuvenation of Freemasonry as ex-servicemen became re-established in civilian life and keen to participate in more normal comradeship and fellowship. An indication of the popularity of Victorian Freemasonry in general and Lodge No.396 in particular during these early post war years is provided by the fact that in the Lodge's 1951-1952 Masonic year, the programme of work, in the space of eight meetings following the Installation, consisted of six First Degrees, six Second Degrees and eight Third Degrees! Several "Emergency Meetings" were held to help ease the situation. This still left room for a lecture on each of the other two nights. Little wonder that the Lodge decided, after this frenetic activity, that every effort should be made to limit the work in the Temple to no more than two first and two second degree candidates on any one meeting night and no more than one third degree candidate on any one meeting night and the Committee of General Purposes directed the Secretary to limit the number of Proposition forms given out.

An estimate was made during this first half of the Fifties that more than seventy percent of metropolitan members of the Lodge were regularly attending meetings, (however, no definition of "regular" in this context is recorded). The Lodge engaged the "Southern Cross Quartet" to attend all meetings at a cost of Three Pounds, twelve shillings and six pence (\$7.25) to provide suitable harmony for the South and this continued for a number of years. 1952 saw Frank Read, who was the first initiate of No.396, chosen by the Grand Master to be a member of an active Grand Lodge Team. During this period, Jack Gamble who rejuvenated the social activities of the Lodge in the middle thirties continued to enthuse the Social Committee. The Committee's highly successful social functions not only engendered camaraderie amongst the members and their wives, but also provided additional financial support for the Lodge's charitable activities over and above the direct and continuing support by Lodge members for the main Masonic charities, namely the Freemasons' Homes and the Freemasons' Hospital.

During the fifties and earlier, a feature in the Masonic Lodges was the entertainment provided in the South. Short "Items of Harmony" were provided by professional artists, usually singers or instrumentalists. Lodge No.396 was fortunate to have members who were able to provide items. These included John J. McFarlane, a talented singer and H.R. (Russ) Gamble, Ken C. B. Bethell, Harry J. Ramsay, who had the ability to perform conjuring tricks at various levels. It was a feature on occasions for these three to combine and to work together to entertain the members.

Scotch Collegians also had a reputation for producing short humorous skits, with an undoubted parochial flavour and / or parodies on well known songs in which all present could join in singing. In 1953 the member's total dues were increased by the addition of "a Charitable Donation". The suggested amount being six shillings (60c). To illustrate the relative costs at this time the Organist was paid the handsome fee of (\$4.20). In 1954-1955 Frank Oldfield occupied the two guineas Master's Chair and during his year in office, 1021 members and visitors attended Scotch Collegians' Lodge meetings. This number had never been achieved before or since. The annual workload in the Lodge room was still extremely heavy and to shorten the waiting list (estimated as being four years long), two Second Degree Candidates and two Third Degree Candidates were given to other Lodges to be Passed and Raised. During his year as Master however, Frank Oldfield still found time to deliver a lecture to the Lodge on "Some Aspects of Symbolism in Freemasonry". This could have been amongst the earliest of the scores of lectures he was to deliver before, during and after his appointment as Grand Lecturer in 1978, an appointment he held for five years.

1955 to 1960

Of special interest was the initiation in 1956 of Frank Fleming, who had returned to the School staff after serving with the A.I.F. during the war. He subsequently became Vice Principal of the School. It is well stated that the enthusiasm of the Social Committee continued to influence the strength of the Lodge. Prominent in leading the Social Committees of that era were Jack McCleery, John Sands Hill and Harry Harrison. Traditional activities were Ladies Nights (usually in the form of a Dinner Dance) and the Annual Kildonan Children's Christmas Picnic in addition to the popular Golf Weekends around Port Phillip Bay. Social activities were extended to include Square Dancing nights and cricket and bowls matches (usually played against other School Lodge teams). Later on, a light hearted car rally was added to the activities for several years. By 1959, enough funds were in the hands of the Social Committee to present the Kildonan Homes with the gymnasium equipment they required. During these years, any member whose wife presented him with a child, was presented by the Lodge with a mug and later a souvenir spoon. That year also saw a further break with the Lodge's Foundation years with the death of the Foundation Treasurer, Fred Whitelaw. He held the position of Treasurer for twenty-nine years until ill health forced him to hand over the reins in 1954 to Bill Scott. Fred's passing left only four remaining Foundation members, namely Nathan Benjamin, Alan Hooper, Tom Morrison and George Collie. It was in 1959 that Grand Lodge saw fit to promote Pat Wood to the rank of Past Senior Grand Deacon in recognition of his service to the Lodge since joining in 1937. In particular, he had carried out with efficiency and distinction the Secretaryship of the Lodge for ten years from 1948 to 1958. To mark the occasion a memorable production entitled "The Life of Wood" was staged in the South. Produced by Frank Read and his "Dramatic Society" players, it was received with enthusiastic acclaim. It is said by some that this was the inspiration of the television series "This is your Life". However, the Lodge was not to be denied a worthy successor. This came in the person of Jim Blair-Holt who was a joining member of No.396 in 1947 and held the position of Secretary for fourteen years in all, being acknowledged by Grand Lodge by the conferred rank of Past Senior Grand Deacon in 1969.

1960 to 1965

The social mores of the sixties, the advent of television etc., saw attendances at all Lodges taking on a declining trend. This prompted the monthly Summonses to give Members the following reminder:- "From Ancient times no Master or Fellow could be absent from his Lodge, especially when warned to appear at it, without incurring a severe censure, unless it appeared to the Master and Wardens that pure necessity hindered him". In 1962 Bill Scott passed away after serving the Lodge as Treasurer from 1954 to 1962. 1962 also saw the permanent abode of the Weekly Luncheon Group established at St. Andrew's Hotel, Carlton. In 1963, Frank Read gathered the support of a team of the Lodge's Past Masters to journey to Colac and carry out the Installation at the Colac Lodge of St. John, of Dick Atkinson Grimshaw, an Old Boy of the School. Neil Turnley who, besides giving sterling service to Grand Lodge, had been instrumental in training the Past Masters of No.396 for the Colac Installation and subsequent No.396 Installations, was elected as the first "Honorary Member" of Scotch Collegians' Lodge. In turn, Neil presented to the Lodge the Director of Ceremonies baton which is still in use today.

In 1965 Nathan Benjamin, one of our last two surviving Foundation members (the other being Alan Hooper) received the rank of Past Grand Sword Bearer after an inordinately long "waiting in the wings". At that time he had been a member of the Lodge for forty years, he had even been at the piano (or organ) at the Foundation of the Lodge in 1925 and had been a continuous Office Bearer in the Lodge in one position or another for thirty two years.

1965 to 1970

This period saw the number of degree working nights lessen considerably. A typical year consisted of no more than five degree working nights (with one candidate per night) and lectures of interest on the other six nights. Of course there was the Installation, Old Boys' Night and the Master's Last Night. Vic Winter retired as Tyler of the Lodge having served in that capacity for thirty-one years. His retirement to Queensland saw Fred Myers, a Past Master of Victoria Lodge No.82, take on the task and remain as the Tyler for many years at Launder Street. The Lodge was saddened by the passing of Alan Edward Hooper. He had been invested as Junior Deacon at the Foundation of the Lodge in 1925 and became the fourth Master of the Lodge in 1928. From 1931 to 1942 he was Director of Ceremonies until he enlisted in the Royal Australian Air Force. After his war service, he returned to No.396 and was again elected to become the twenty-first Master of the Lodge in 1945. The event marked the first and only time to this date in the Lodge's history, that a Brother was installed in the Chair of King Solomon of the Scotch Collegians' Lodge for the second time. He was again appointed Director of Ceremonies from 1949 to 1951 and attained the rank Past Senior Grand Deacon. He also was honoured with Grand Rank in both the Mark and Chapter. In 1967 the Government took over the running and management of the Kildonan Homes, so the Lodge was without its own charity. This period saw the further strengthening of social activities with the commencement of barbeques held at various member's homes together with fishing weekends at venues between Cowes and Point Lonsdale with various members acting as host. The decade of the sixties closed auspiciously when Ken Scott was installed as Worshipful Master by Most Wor. Bro. Mr. Justice Frank Nelson, Past Grand Master (an Old Scotch Collegian who was later elected an honorary member of the Lodge). Frank Nelson had acted as Installing Master at a number of earlier Installations at No.396 commencing with that of Frank Oldfield in 1954.

Ken's accession to the chair revived memories of his late father Bill Scott, who was Master in 1932 and Treasurer of the Lodge from 1954 to 1962. Ken's Installation in 1969 marked the first occasion in the Lodge's history that the son of a previous master of the Lodge has been installed in the Chair.

1970 to 1975

In 1970 the Lodge was privileged to accept the offer of the then Grand Master, Most Wor. Bro. Prof. Townsend and his active team to carry out the Installation of Alan Capell. A highlight of the night was the presentation to the Lodge of the Past Master's jewel of the late Sir Harry Lawson who was the Foundation Senior Warden in 1925 and its second Worshipful Master in 1926. (Sir Harry was Premier of the State of Victoria from 1918 to 1924). Another interesting feature of the 1970 Installation was that of the twelve Grand Officers accompanying the Most Wor. Grand Master, four were Old Scotch Collegians. In 1972, Jim Blair-Holt retired as Secretary of the Lodge after fourteen years of sterling service. During the 1970s, Installations at No.396 were carried out by many of our own Past Masters and Past Grand Officers led by such illustrious Freemasons and Old Boys as Frank Nelson, Neil Turnley, Willis Parton, and John Clements. Hugh Gray's year as master saw Scotch's turn to host the Combined School Lodges meeting in 1974 which was held at Launder Street, our home base. Somehow 200 Brethren squeezed into the Lodge room on that memorable occasion, loose chairs being brought in to accommodate the overflow. As the State Government had taken over the Kildonan Homes, the Lodge looked for an organisation which would appreciate our assistance. This came through the youth probationary centre "Arthur Harrison House" conducted under the direction of the Presbyterian Church. Two members of the Lodge in Jack Birch and Doug Aitchison joined the Board of Management. Swimming and boating outings were arranged for the boys and the Lodge provided a septic tank which was installed at their Anglesea camp site. Other practical aid was given in sports equipment and entertainment. To the Lodge's traditional social activities, the Social Committee began adding selected theatre nights under the leadership of Ken Mountford, Chairman of the Committee. The first of many successful functions of this type was held in September 1974 when members and their wives thoroughly enjoyed the Musical "Irene".

The Weekly Luncheon Group under the astute leadership of Pat Wood changed their venue to the Old Colonial Inn in Fitzroy and remained there till 1983.

1975 to 1980

Although the Lodge had had some School staff as members in the past, it was a great delight to have Stan Brown initiated into the Lodge in 1975. Stan eventually completed 29 years as a Master at the School from 1954 to 1983. The sentimental ties which are one source of Freemasonry's strength were brought home to all present at Stan's initiation when Stan's 93 year old father was present to witness the ceremony. This period saw another association with the school when Bro. David Hosking joined. At that time David was a Senior Master and during the eighties became Vice-Principal. In December 1977 the ties with the School were deepened when Alec Fraser, having retired as the chaplain of the School twelve years previously, was initiated into No.396. He was later appointed Grand Lodge Chaplain and in this capacity he served Freemasonry throughout Victoria. During 1980 Alec proposed Bob Dean, a Minister of the Church and a former member of the school staff to join the Lodge. Bob later served as our Chaplain for several 1975 was also the start of the celebration of the fiftieth year vears. since the formation of the Lodge. In the same year to the delight of all members, as he was our Chaplain for many years, Nathan Benjamin received the 60 year Bar to his Service Jewel. August 1977 saw the Lodge congratulating both Frank Oldfield and Bruce Latimer on receiving the "Queen's Silver Jubilee" Medal. Adding to the variety of social outings, the Committee with Stan Brown's kind co-operation started "Farmer Brown's" Family Picnic which was a great success for many years. This tradition was then carried on with "Farmer Long's" day by courtesy of Ian Long whilst Bob Dean also allowed his farm to be used at Berwick until the travel worried him and he resigned from the Lodge in 1986.

1980 to 1985

This period saw a dramatic change for the Lodge, due to deep concern by many members of No.396 with the deterioration of the Launder Street A committee was formed from the Lodges meeting at premises. Launder Street including Scotch Collegians, and this committee approached Grand Lodge for funds to carry out improvements. During 1981 Grand Lodge advised all concerned that they were unable to assist with any financial aid. This put a stop to plans for serious structural modifications, however some cosmetic improvements were made, including the gift to the Temple of a resuscitation unit from funds raised by our Social Committee. One particularly successful social activity which lasted through the eighties was the Progressive Dinners. Although tougher road regulations inhibited their continuance, they were an undoubted success. The venue for the weekly luncheons, first held in about 1949 was again changed from the Carringbush Hotel to the Yorkshire Stingo Hotel in Abbotsford. A special Diamond Jubilee reenactment of the consecration of the Lodge was held on Saturday 16th November 1984, as a substitute for our normal meeting, in conjunction with the Installation of Bob Arnold as Master of the Lodge. In the early eighties the Government nationalised Arthur Harrison House, which had been previously managed under the direction of the Presbyterian Church, so a new charitable effort was required. By 1985 we had offered assistance to Kew Cottages to "clean up" after their annual fete. The management and parents of Kew Cottages greatly appreciated the help we were able to provide.

1985 to 1990

By 1986 all the Lodges meeting in Launder Street had formed a committee which involved itself with the task of improving the Launder Street building both inside and out and a noticeable difference could be seen, though, with the closing of some Lodges during the eighties, the load became heavier on the Lodges that were still meeting there. However, by 1988 the five Lodges that were still members of that committee, decided to celebrate the centenary of Victorian Freemasonry by holding a combined special meeting on Tuesday 21st March. Bill Galvin who was our Worshipful Master at the time, acted as Junior Warden. Grand Lodge held their Centenary Grand Installation meeting at the Melbourne Tennis Centre (Melbourne Park).

It was extremely well supported with Freemasons, their families and friends coming from all over Victoria. This year saw our second venture into our own "Installation Team" travelling to the country. John Clements supported by Past Masters of No.396 installed Bill Mactier as Master of the Murchison Lodge. The No.396 Social Committee was still working very hard and in 1986 a "Rubber Ducky" boat was presented to the "Scotch at Cowes" committee for the use of the boys. From the sixties to the nineties, many members of the Lodge had been associated with "Scotch at Cowes", and this presentatio recognised that close affiliation. During 1987, the Committee of General Purposes which since consecration had been comprised of all the Past Masters of the Lodge with three Master Masons (generally the two Wardens and in more recent years, the Treasurer) was completely re-organised in accordance with Grand Lodge suggestions that Lodges should restrict the size of committees to consist of Three Master Masons, Three Past Masters, The Worshipful Master, the Immediate Past Master, both Wardens, the Secretary and the Treasurer. In more recent times, the Director and Assistant Director of Ceremonies, the Secretary of the Social Committee and the Assistant Secretary have been co-opted.


This new format had the power to co-opt for special occasions such as Old Boy's Night etc. and, as it has a more workable membership, it meets four times a year and should have a far greater influence and allows the Worshipful Master to institute his particular ideas. The Past Masters' meeting still takes place once a year when the Master Elect presents his team for the ensuing year and general expressions of support to the new master are made in a convivial atmosphere. In 1987 Neil Roberts, the School's Bursar, was elected a member of the Lodge. He joined Ken Field, the much loved and respected previous Bursar, who had also joined the Lodge two years earlier in 1985. Scotch Collegians were again the host Lodge of the Combined Schools Lodge meeting in 1988 with Gordon Carr being Master. Over two hundred Brethren attended and the Launder Street temple was crammed. The general opinion was that it was a great night to be remembered by all in attendance. In May 1989 a number of members volunteered to provide transport for any member who otherwise would have been unable to attend the Lodge Meetings due to an inability to drive. This reestablished a service that had been provided when required in the past.

1990 to 1995

After Bob Arnold and a special committee had made a thorough investigation of facilities available for Lodge meetings, a meeting was called and Bob Arnold and his team presented an overview of the future of the Launder Street Temple and its capacity to provide for Lodge No.396 into the future. At a further meeting, having received permission from Grand Lodge to change the time and place of the Lodge meetings, it was resolved by majority to move to the Camberwell Hall and change the night to the first Thursday of each month, instead of the first Wednesday as had been at Launder Street, for the first Wednesday at Camberwell was already taken. The first meeting in the new venue took place on Thursday 7th February, 1991. Keith Weymouth was the Inaugural Master and that meeting was so well attended that there was not a spare seat available in the Temple. Friday 7th December, 1990 saw the first meeting of the "Archives" committee which had been formed to complete the history of the Lodge from consecration to the present day and to collect and safely store such objects and materials as were considered worthy of preservation. The committee consisted at that time of Jim Blair-Holt, Frank Oldfield and Pat Wood. It was Pat that collected and collated all the old minute books, membership details etc. At their second meeting, Brian Morris and Keith Weymouth had been coopted, but the committee faltered with the deaths of both Frank Oldfield and Jim Blair-Holt and came to a virtual stop until 1996.

The Ladies Morning Coffee Group was started in 1991 and still continues to meet several times a year. A Bridge group also had formed with the members interested taking turns to host the "play". In 1993 the Wednesday luncheons moved from Abbotsford to the "Beehive" Hotel in Hawthorn. In March 1993, the Lodge initiated another Past President of O.S.C.A. into the Lodge, namely Bill Tingate. With the presence of his father Clive (one of our oldest Old Boys at the time) and his cousin John Tingate, the ceremony took on a family atmosphere.

A HISTORY OF OLD SCOTCH COLLEGIANS' LODGE, No. 396 22

In October 1994 under the guidance of Ian Picken, a golf weekend was arranged at Corowa Golf Club at which forty-eight attended and enjoyed the renowned comradeship of No.396. During the weekend the members also attended an Installation night at Wangaratta. Niael Cooper, an Old Boy from Benalla, invited No.396 to install him in the Chair of King Solomon and a team of ten Brethren from No.396 took on the task. Keith Weymouth was Installing Master and the floor team was Bruce Symon Proclaiming, with Bob Arnold and Geoff Weller Presenting Officers. This was a very happy night which will long be remembered by all who attended. The December meeting of 1993 commenced the current practice of Brethren bringing a suitable present for a child and "Father Christmas" collecting the same to be presented to the Salvation Army for distribution. This effort has been an appreciated success and undoubtedly will continue for years to come. The Christmas dinner that took over from the Dinner/Dance was well established during the nineties and it was pleasing to see several of the widows of past brethren attending at the Lodge's invitation. The practice of the Worshipful Master presenting each widow with a Christmas pudding has been continued and is appreciated. Although a few of our Members had been involved for many years, 1990 was the first year the Lodge itself became involved in door knocking in the Hawthorn area for the annual Salvation Army Red Shield Appeal.

1995 to 2000

Victorian Masonic history was made by No.396 in February 1995 under the guidance of the Master, Jeff Kiddle, by holding a non-ceremonial meeting, with the approval of Grand Lodge, at the new Cardinal Pavilion, which had been opened at the School only in the previous December. Wives and friends, both male and female, attended with an opening address by the Worshipful Master; Bruce Symon talked on the Old Scotch Collegians' Association, its history and activities, and the choir entertained. This was a great success. Grand Lodge appreciated the influence such a night could have on membership, and so approved the concept to such an extent that they have now brought out an "Open Night Kit" for the use of all Victorian Lodges. Another outcome of that night were the presentations by the Lodge of a School crest to be installed in the Boykett Room, and a wheel-chair to be held in the Archives for the use of Old Boys touring the School. With the determined efforts of Pat Wood, the Archives committee was re-jigged and Maurie Smith, Ian Latimer and Manson Russel were co-opted for the purpose of completing the Lodge's history. They each took on a twenty-five year period of examining minutes, summonses and documents. By June, 1997 their efforts were assembled and Bruce Symon was co-opted to create a "rough-up" for discussion. Ean Cumbrae-Stewart assisted, and Brian Morris and David Ferguson completed an alphabetical list of past and present members of No.396, as well as a numerical list. Both of these lists are appended to the history. In 1999 Bill Tingate was asked to facilitate final production.

During this period photographs became a regular enhancement to our monthly Summons which took on the character of a news-letter for those unable to attend a meeting. This is also a first in Victorian Freemasonry it is believed. Tony Cordell, a Master Mason's representative on the Committee of General Purposes, advised that he could have a wooden case made to protect the Lodge Banner when not in use. This was agreed to and a case of various Australian timbers was purchased and has been in use since. For various reasons, the Archives at the School were in disarray and an appeal by the O.S.C.A. to the Lodge saw a team of volunteers led by Bruce Symon take over the task of collating, organising and supervising the Archives and Museum for which the School has been very grateful. With the Archives as a venue, the Secretariat of the Lodge made its home at the School which brought into prominence, amongst our future members, the various attributes of Freemasonry in general and No.396 in particular. May 1997 was a particularly happy month for the Lodge. The first Thursday was the normal Old Boys night and the fifth Thursday saw Scotch as the host Lodge for the Combined Schools Lodge meeting with John Bell in the Chair. Whilst our South is renowned for its happy and varied nights under the charge of Keith Weymouth, it must be said that the "Three Tennis" on the Combined Schools night set a standard that will be hard to equal.

In January 1999, Grand Lodge invited No.396 to demonstrate the First Degree ceremony in the No.1 lodge room at the Dallas Brookes Masonic Centre, to enable the GL Choir to coordinate the revised ceremonial music with the ritual. A large number of masonic representatives were present.

The father and son combinations of present members are Bob and Peter England, Ron and Ian Gould, Bruce and Steve Latimer, Jock and Ian Mackenzie, and Brian and David Morris, all of whom deserve special mention. Brothers who are both still members are: Bob and Bill Arnold, Tony and Haydn Cordell, Les and Lou Hyams, Bruce and Ian Latimer, Peter and Brian Turnley, Geoff and Rob Weller, and Gary and Joe Edwards. In November 2000 the Lodge celebrated its 75th birthday and Bill Tingate was installed into the Chair, assisted by his father Clive aged 99 (then one of the oldest Old Boys).

FINALLY

The association between the Old Scotch Collegians' Association and the Lodge is invaluable. The support from the OSCA Secretariat and office over the years and currently is also invaluable. The following Lodge members have been OSCA Presidents: Keith Wilson, Vic Nilsen, Pat Wood, Keith Ness, Ken Gifford, Brian Randall, Bill Tingate, Bruce Symon, and Rob Logie-Smith. Keith Wilson, Keith Ness, Vic Nilsen, Pat Wood and Brian Randall along with Malcolm Taylor who joined the Lodge in 1994, all saw service on the School Council. The association with other affiliated societies of OSCA has seen members of the Lodge also in numerous positions and offices within the Football Club, the Ski Club (Koomerang), the Tennis Club, Rover Scouts, the Bowls Club, the Cardinal Club, the Hockey Club, the Cricket Club, the Bush Walking Club, and the Food & Wine Society, and combined activities are held with several of them. The expansion of Probus in recent years has seen many of our members take leadership roles in that organisation.

In February 2001, at a Special Meeting, the members overwhelmingly resolved to formalise a recent policy to amend the name of the Lodge to **Old Scotch Collegians' Lodge No.396** to clarify the Lodge's role as an Old Boys activity, acknowledging its affiliation with the OSCA.

We could do no better to conclude the Lodge's 75 year history than by quoting some of the words of the late Alec Fraser, incorporating extracts from our Masonic ritual:

For a goodly heritage, proud traditions and cherished memories, we give thanks to the Great Architect of the Universe for those favours already received. May He continue to preserve our Order by cementing and adorning it with every moral and social virtue.

APPENDIX 2000 - 2012

2000 - 2005

In November, 2009 David Morris was installed in the chair, continuing the Old Scotch tradition of sons of Past Masters of the lodge going into the chair, which was commenced by Ken Scott in 1969. The traditional "Old Boys Night" held at the May meeting was also livened up in the South with a talk by John Bell on "Being a Good Sport". The regular participation in the Salvation Army "Red Shield Appeal" by collecting from houses in the Hawthorn area was carried out under the leadership of Bob Arnold.

At the June meeting in 2001 the Old Scotch Lodge was visited by the Grand Master, MWBro. J.R. Wilson and his Grand Team, who performed a demonstration of the consecration ceremony to mark the 75th anniversary of the consecration of the Scotch Collegians' Lodge. The previous month Bill Galvin presented a lecture, written by Graeme Roseby, on the life of Sir Harry Lawson, Premier of Victoria from 1918 to 1924 and Foundation Senior Warden of the Lodge. Once again the lodge participated in the Red Shield Appeal and collected \$9,107, which took the amount collected by the lodge to over \$100,000.

At the installation in 2001 Keith Weymouth was the Installing Master to install Rob Brelaz in the Chair. As Rob Brelaz lived on a farming property at Nilma North, near Warragul, he invited the lodge to a Sunday barbecue at his property. It was a very successful event. The Old Boys Night in 2002 was another successful evening and the attendance in the South of Leigh McGregor, the about to retire Director of the Old Scotch Collegians' Association, highlighted another element of the close link between these two organisations.

In November, 2002 Steve Latimer was the Installing Master to install Graeme Weber in the Chair. The lodge continued to make efforts to attract members and participated in an Open Night at the Camberwell Masonic Centre. Graeme Weber, as a geologist, has a business interest in the Walhalla District, so for the major social event, for his year in the chair, he arranged a visit to the Walhalla Lodge which was established in 1876. This historic lodge meets in an equally historic building. The year concluded with an Annual Dinner in the Boykett Room on the school grounds looking out over the river.

Stuart McArthur was installed as Master in November, 2003. In March, 2004 the lodge held a closed meeting to discuss the implementation of a Lodge Renewal Programme. The evening was led by the District Co-ordinator, Peter Simpson, and resulted in a spirited discussion on the future of the Old Scotch Lodge. A visit to a Sunday picnic race meeting at Yarra Glen was an enjoyable social activity early in the year. In the South another of our successful Trivia Nights, under the control of our resident Trivia Master, John Bell, made for a successful Ladies Night.

A HISTORY OF OLD SCOTCH COLLEGIANS' LODGE, No. 396

28

2005 – 2010

In November, 2004 Bruce Symon was installed as Master of O.S.C.L. At his installation he commented that, at the age of 74, he was the oldest member to be installed as Master of the Lodge and he was taking over from Stuart McArthur, who a year earlier at the age of 31, had been the youngest member of the Lodge to be installed in the position. A special meeting was held during 2005 to discuss whether O.S.C.L. should move to another Masonic Centre or stay at Camberwell. After a lengthy debate and the presentation of several proposals, the majority agreed to stay at Camberwell. A highlight of the Souths in 2005 was the Ladies Night and Trivia Night in August, under the control of trivia master, John Bell.

In November, 2005 John Bell was the Installing Master to put Ian McMurtrie in the chair. As well as being master of the Lodge, Ian was commencing his involvement with the Freemasons Task Force and he led a number of lodge members on a working bee in March, 2006 to the Stawell area, which had been badly affected by fires a month earlier. A highlight of the social activities in 2006 was a Sunday lunch held at the Anglesea Surf Lifesaving Club, where Prue and Graeme Weber have been stalwarts for many years. A speaker in the South in 2006 was Ken Masterton, who as well as being an active Freemason, was very involved with the Child and Family Care Network, which had evolved from what had previously been the Burwood Boys Home. This was the commencement of a long association with what later became known as bestChance Child Family Care.

In November, 2006 John Bell again served as the Installing Master to install Ray .Dawson. This stage of the life of O.S.C.L. appeared to be the beginning of the salvation of the Lodge, for in the period from March, 2006 to March, 2009 ten young men were initiated in to the ranks of membership of O.S.C.L., but not many of them have gone on to become active in the Lodge. It was also during 2007 that Pat Wood became the first member of the Lodge to receive a Seventy Year Jewel, unfortunately at the time Pat's eyesight and general health had begun to deteriorate and he could not attend lodge to receive the Jewel and was therefore presented with it at his home.

The installation held in November, 2007 was a special event as the incoming master, Peter Turnley, was not only was a long serving member of the lodge, but was also the son of a very eminent Freemason, Neil Turnley, who was an Honorary Member and in his later years became a regular member of the Scotch Lodge. The Installing Master was Willis Parton, another eminent Freemason and Old Boy of the school who had been a good friend of Neil Turnley. Although a number of young men had been initiated in to the lodge, it was being stressed that an ongoing campaign needed to be run to encourage the younger Old Boys to join the lodge. To further this aim a mailout was done following a programme using different years of leaving the school. At the Old Boys Night in 2009, the traditional format for the May meeting, there was a visit to the lodge by the Old Scotch Heritage Club. Some lodge members are active in the Heritage Club and several of the Heritage Club visitors were former members of the lodge. The selection of a Master-Elect to be installed in November, 2008 occurred after the anticipated election of the Senior Warden could not take place, and John Maynard, who was a Joining Member in 1994, allowed his name to be proposed to become Master-Elect. John had been active in Grand Lodge and had just retired from the position of President of the Board of Benevolence. John was installed by the Grand .Master, Gary Sebo. A number of members of the lodge attended the Maroondah District Charity Banquet Dinner at which Gary Edwards made a presentation on the lodge's charitable involvement with the bestChance Child Family Care Network. We were delighted to be awarded a donation of \$1,000 from the Board of Benevolence. An application was made to the Accreditation and Quality Management Committee to be assessed for accreditation. After the submission of relevant documentation and an assessment of ritual had been made, the lodge was awarded provisional accreditation at the Quarterly Communication held in September, 2008.

At the installation in 2009 Neil Hart-Smith was installed by the Senior Grand Warden, Tony Bucca. A major social activity that year was a second visit by the lodge to the Walhalla Lodge. This lodge meets on a Saturday so lodge members, many accompanied by their wives, were able to have a weekend at Walhalla and renew their previous acquaintance with this historic lodge. Ian McMurtrie, who was already an Executive Member of the Freemasons Taskforce, was appointed State Co-Ordinator of this important component of Freemasonry. With our member, Gary Edwards, also being an Executive Member of the Taskforce, Old Scotch Lodge plays a greater role in the Taskforce than any other lodge. Lodge members also participated in the work of the Taskforce and in May a number of lodge members travelled to Licola, in East Gippsland, to undertake tree planting in an area that had previously suffered flood damage. During 2010 a further application was made to the Accreditation and Quality Management Committee for the Lodge to be granted Full Accreditation. Once again assessors were appointed and following the submission of the relevant documentation and an assessment of a full opening and closing of the lodge, a certificate of Full Accreditation was presented to the lodge at the December Quarterly Communication of Grand Lodge.

2010 - 2012

In November, 2010, Richard Tait was installed in the chair by the Grand Master, Vaughan Werner. At the Quarterly Communication of Grand Lodge in 2010 it was announced that Freemasonry Victoria had entered into a contract to purchase a five storey building in Whitehorse Road, Box Hill. The two upper floors of this building would be converted into lodge rooms and associated facilities. This purchase would also involve the eventual disposal of several existing Masonic Centres, including the one at Camberwell.

A HISTORY OF OLD SCOTCH COLLEGIANS' LODGE, No. 396 30

In March, 2011 the lodge was the host of a Social and Charity Picnic Barbecue at the Diamond Valley Volunteers' Miniature Railway at Eltham. This exercise combined the provision of an outing to this establishment for children from bestChance, the lodge's main charitable involvement, and a social activity for lodge members and their families. An amendment to the Lodge Resolutions was proposed that would enable Freemasons, who were the brother, son or father of an existing member, while not being an Old Boy of Scotch, to be proposed as a Joining Member. This proposal evoked an extensive discussion, but when put to a secret ballot it was approved.

In November, 2011 Brian Turnley was installed in the chair by the Grand Master, Vaughan Werner. In 2012 the Old Scotch Lodge had the right, by rotation, to be the host of the 76th Annual Meeting of the Combined School Lodges. This meeting was held on Thursday, 31st May and the lodge reintroduced the old format for this meeting in which the Scotch Master, Brian Turnley, acted as the Worshipful Master, but all other offices were occupied by one of the other six school lodges.
